Dear Sir:

The following report of the Military and Naval Department is submitted in accordance with Section 26, Article IV, Military and Naval Code of Illinois, approved 8 July 1957 and covers the period between 1 November 1958 and 31 October 1960.

During this biennial period two important changes have occurred in the Illinois National Guard.

In 1959 the entire Illinois Army National Guard was reorganized under the pentomic concept and the number of units reduced from 160 to 119. In the process of reorganization all units were either reorganized, converted, redesignated and/or consolidated. The reorganization was completed during the period 1 March-31 May 1959 and the units attended Field Training that year in their pentomic status. Despite the reorganization the units and organizations maintained their excellent training status which is shown in detail in the sections on Inspections in this report.

In addition to the above the other major change in the Illinois Army National Guard was the implementation of the Reserve Officers Personnel Act which became effective 1 July 1960 and made all officers in the component subject to the provisions on elimination and mandatory promotion established therein. What the eventual effect of this law will be is under study at the present time with a view to determine the long range projection necessary for retaining or securing officers required for the efficient operation and training of the Army National Guard.

The Air Defense Missile Units of the 202d Artillery Group, Illinois Army National Guard were accepted into the Air Defense of the Continental United States and assigned to On-Site stations in the Chicago-Gary Defense Area. The 1st and 2d Missile Battalions of the 202d Artillery Group each took over 4 On-Site positions from units of the United States Army thereby relieving these troops for duty elsewhere.

The State Military Forces have attained a high degree of efficiency and are capable of successfully accomplishing their assigned mission, both Federal and State.

RESERVE OFFICER PERSONNEL ACT

Public Law 773—83rd Congress

The Reserve Officer Personnel Act (ROPA) which has been applicable to the Illinois Air National Guard since 1 July 1955 became effective in the Illinois Army National Guard on 1 July 1960.

Under the provisions of this law all officers of the Illinois National Guard are subject to the age in grade, length of service, mandatory promotion and qualification requirements applicable to a reserve officer of the same component of the Armed Forces. To secure Federal recognition as a member of the Illinois National Guard an officer must meet the requirements for appointment or promotion in the respective Reserve Force. Therefore the career of all officers in the Illinois National Guard is controlled by the Federal regulations established in accordance with this law.

TROOP BASIS ALLOTMENT FOR ILLINOIS

The Federal Government in conformity with its overall planning for a balanced force to provide for our national security allotted to the State of Illinois 141 units (Army, Air, and Navy) with an allotted strength of 16,602 officers, warrant officers, and enlisted men as follows:

THE NATIONAL GUARD IN THE ACTIVE DEFENSE OF THE UNITED STATES IN TIME OF PEACE

During the period of this report the Federal Government assigned missions to both the Army and Air National Guard in the Active Defense of the Nation.

The Air National Guard is actively participating in the Air Defense Command Alert Program by providing personnel and aircraft fully armed from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset each day. Pilots on alert when properly notified are air borne within five minutes for the purpose of intercepting any unknown or known enemy aircraft in the area.

The Army National Guard for the first time in its history is manning On-Site NIKE positions in the Chicago-Gary Defense Area and two battalions of the 202d Artillery Group of the Illinois National Guard now man 8 On-Site positions in the State of Illinois.

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ILLINOIS OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL

The Illinois Officer Candidate School was established on 1 June 1957.

This school is organized to train enlisted men of the Illinois Army National Guard to fill existing and future Second Lieutenant vacancies in the Army units of the Illinois National Guard.

The Program of Instruction offered is a balanced curricula of military subjects developed by The United States Army Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia.

The school is staffed by efficient, capable and experienced officers.

Intensive training, rigid standards of conduct and discipline, and an exacting manner of performance is demanded of the candidates.

The object of the school is to develop and train the highest type qualified enlisted men for appointment as future officers in the Illinois Army National Guard.

The Graduates of this school will be the leaders of the Illinois Army National Guard in the years that lie ahead, thereby preserving the great traditions and prestige of the National Guard. It is to this end that the Illinois Officer Candidate School is dedicated.

The training year is divided into two phases. The first consisting of two (2) weeks at Summer Field Training and the second phase consisting of ten (10) week-end sessions conducted at Camp Lincoln, Springfield, Illinois.



Seventy-eight (78) candidates were accepted for Class II of which forty-three (43) received diplomas presented by the Honorable William G. Stratton, 7 June 1959 at Camp Lincoln, Springfield, Illinois.

Eighty-two (82) candidates were accepted for Class III of which forty-one (41) received diplomas 5 June 1960 at Camp Lincoln, Springfield, Illinois.

Eighty-two (82) candidates were accepted for Class IV and are now in training. Graduation exercises are planned for 4 June 1961 at Camp Lincoln, Springfield, Illinois.

With the initiation of the Illinois Officer Candidate School all commissions as Second Lieutenants in the Illinois Army National Guard with the exception of doctors, dentists, chaplains, and judge advocates, are limited to graduates of the Illinois Officer Candidate School, the Officer Candidate School of another State, The U. S. Army Regular Officer Candidate School or the U. S. Army Special National Guard Officer Candidate School.
